Pupil Premium 2014- 2015 Evaluation

Pupil Premium Funding is in addition to main school funding. It is allocated to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for free school meals (FSM) and their peers, by ensuring that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most. We were allocated £247,659 for the current financial year (2014-15) and used the funds as follows:
