Pupil Premium 2013–2014

Pupil Premium Funding is in addition to main school funding. It is allocated to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for free school meals (FSM) and their peers, by ensuring that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most. We were allocated £152,100 for the financial year (2013-14) and used the funds as follows:

Ten children on FSM attended these. Of these 7 achieved a level 4 or 5 and 3 received a level 3 in their SATS. |
